


Dear Friends,

Innovative Research and Analysis



This summer, we launched a 14-part series, <u>Novel Threats: National Security</u> and the Coronavirus Pandemic. In weekly conversations with Reiss Center experts and affiliates such as <u>Wally Adeyemo</u>, <u>Lisa Monaco</u>, <u>Richard Pildes</u> and <u>Nicholas Rasmussen</u>, we explored essential topics at the intersection of national security and the pandemic—including leadership, the global economy, cybersecurity, the 2020 elections and more.





This past year, we were pleased to unveil the <u>War Powers Resolution</u>

Reporting Project: the first publicly accessible, searchable, living resource on the war powers reporting practice of every U.S. President since 1973. Since its release, the project has become an essential tool for policymakers and legal experts. The database will be updated regularly in an ongoing research effort spearheaded by <u>Tess Bridgeman</u>, Senior Fellow and Visiting Scholar at the Reiss Center.


Preparing Future Leaders

Distinguished Senior Fellow Lisa Monaco moderated an early <u>forum</u> on the legal and policy dimensions of the impending Covid-19 crisis.




We joined with *Just Security* and the Yale Law School National Security Group to convene an expert <u>panel</u> on racial justice in national security.







